
## Bird of paradise:

#### What is it?

Bird of paradise also know as a crane plant or strelitzia reginae got its name because from a distance the vibrant electric blue and neon orange flower looks like the head of an exotic bird. The plant is native to South Africa and is pollinated by sunbirds. The sturdy leaf stems can bear the weight of several birds at a time.

# Why is it significant now?

Birds of paradise typically bloom in the winter to early spring, depending on the specific species and location. The blooming period can last anywhere from a few weeks to several months. However, birds of paradise are slow growing plants and can take 5 - 6 years to produce their first flowers. As you can see, our bird of paradise plant in the lobby by the reception desk has had its first ever bloom in this building!

You may recall that many of you attended a talk by SDC a while ago, where they shared updates on the building projects, including the Nursery, which is scheduled for completion in early 2025.


